

About the Training

This one-day training is offered by the Partnership for People with Disabilities in response to the following realities:

- ❖ Children with disabilities are at increased risk for all types of abuse and neglect.
- ❖ Abuse and neglect of these children occurs more often in out-of-family settings.
- ❖ It can be more difficult to recognize abuse or neglect of children with disabilities.
- ❖ Many professionals are unaware of specific risk factors and indicators of abuse and neglect for children with disabilities.
- ❖ Many professionals are unfamiliar with the special needs of children with disabilities.
- ❖ Children with disabilities experience a "cascade of injustices" following abuse and neglect, in which their reports are not believed, or are not investigated, or are not prosecuted.
- ❖ Children with disabilities may not receive adequate treatment for the effects of abuse and neglect.

Trainers

This course is presented by an interdisciplinary team of expert trainers, including an educator, a law enforcement officer, a child protective services professional, and a parent advocate for children with disabilities.

Trainers model interdisciplinary collaboration and foster discussion among participants about ways to improve the local collaborative response to abuse and neglect of children with disabilities.

- ◆ How widespread is the problem of abuse and neglect of children with disabilities?
- ◆ What is the relationship between abuse and disability?
- ◆ Why are children with disabilities at greater risk for abuse and neglect?
- ◆ What types of abuse and neglect are experienced by children with disabilities?
- ◆ Why is it more difficult to recognize abuse and neglect of children with disabilities?
- ◆ What are some specific signs and indicators of abuse and neglect of children with disabilities?
- ◆ What are the roles of parent advocates and professionals in identification and reporting of abuse and neglect of children with disabilities?
- ◆ How can professionals and parent advocates collaborate to prevent abuse and neglect of these children, and to improve the outcomes for those children with disabilities who experience abuse and neglect?
