PSYCHOLOGY Major Requirements

The Bachelor of Science in Psychology curriculum requires a minimum of 30 credits in psychology courses. A maximum of 40 credits in psychology (this limit does not apply to PSYC courses numbered 490 and above) can be presented for the degree. At least 15 of the 30 minimum required credits must be completed at VCU. All students must complete PSYC 101, 214, & 317. Students may pursue the Standard Curriculum, which includes PSYC 451 and at least one course from each of four content areas (see below). Or in addition to the Core and instead of the Standard Curriculum, after successful completion of PSYC 101 and 214 with "C" grades or better, students may apply in writing to the Department of Psychology's undergraduate director to pursue one of concentrations listed below.

Standard Curriculum: In addition to the Core, the student must complete PSYC451 and at least one course from each of the following four content areas and 5-6 credits in Psychology electives to arrive at minimum of 30 credits in Psychology:

- **Developmental:** PSYC 301 Child Psychology OR PSYC 304 Life Span Developmental Psychology (cannot take both for credit toward a degree); PSYC302 Psychology of Adolescence; PSYC 306 Psychology of Adult Development; GRTY 410 Introduction to Gerontology.
- **Social/Personality:** PSYC 309 Personality; PSYC 321 Social Psychology; PSYC/AFAM 322 Personality and Behavior of the African-American; PSYC 323 Interpersonal Relations; PSYC/RELS 333 Psychology and Religious Experience; PSYC/MMNS 335 Psychology of Women; PSYC/SOCY 341 Group Dynamics.
- **Physiological/Learning:** PSYC 401 Physiological Psychology; PSYC 406 Perception; PSYC 410 Principles of Learning and Cognition.
- **Self-Development/Applied Psychology:** PSYC 303 Personal Adjustment; PSYC 308 Stress and its Management; PSYC 310 Industrial Psych; PSYC 318 Tests and Measurement; PSYC 340 Intro to the Helping Relationship; PSYC 407 Psych of the Abnormal; PSYC 412 Health Psych; PSYC 426 Child Psychopathology.

Pre-Graduate School Concentration: An overall GPA of 3.25 and 3.25 GPA in psychology are required to successfully complete this concentration which consists of 34 credit hours including the core. Other courses include PSYC 304, 318, 321, 401, 407, 410, 451, and either PSYC 492, 493 or 494 (3 credits).

Life Science Concentration: An overall GPA of 2.5 and a 2.5 GPA in psychology and concentration courses are required to successfully complete this concentration. **NOTE:** If you follow this concentration but at the time of graduation do not meet the 2.5 GPA requirements, you cannot graduate under the Standard Curriculum unless you have taken PSYC 451 or courses in the Developmental and Social/Personality areas. This concentration consists of 34 credit hours including the core. BIOL 201(satisfies biology collateral requirement); PSYC401, 406, 410, 412, PHTX400, BIOL 445, and either PSYC492, 493 or 494 (3 credits).

Applied Psychology Concentration: An overall GPA of 2.5 and a 2.5 GPA in psychology and concentration courses are required to successfully complete this concentration. **NOTE:** If you follow this concentration but at the time of graduation do not meet the 2.5 GPA requirements, you cannot graduate under the standard curriculum unless you have taken PSYC 451 or courses in the Physiological/Learning area. This concentration consists of 31 credit hours including the core. Other courses include PSYC304, 308, 309, 318, 340, 407, and either PSYC492, 493 or 494 (3 credits).

Urban Psychology Concentration: An overall GPA of 2.5 and a 2.5 GPA in psychology and concentration courses are required to successfully complete this concentration. **NOTE:** If you follow this concentration but at time of graduation do not meet the 2.5 GPA requirements, you cannot graduate under the standard curriculum unless you have taken PSYC 451 or courses in the Physiological/Learning content area. This concentration consists of 34 credit hours including the core. PSYC 302, 304, 322, 340, and either PSYC493 or 494 (3 credits), POLI 321, RELS 340, URSP 116.
