Social Work

Description of Social Work

Social workers address personal and social problems; formulate, implement and evaluate policies and programs; engage in knowledge development for the profession; and influence community decision making. Social workers work with individuals, families and communities who experience vulnerability because of the lack of personal, social and/or institutional resources to meet their emotional, health and economic needs.

The B.S.W. Program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of the Council on Social Work Education. The curriculum is designed to prepare graduates for beginning level generalist social work practice. This approach assumes interdependence between individuals and their social environment. Students gain a broad knowledge about individuals, families, groups, organizations and communities and the ways in which each support or inhibit optimal functioning.

To be prepared for this level of practice, students learn the history and current development of social welfare programs, methods of influencing social change, professional values and ethics, the particular needs of oppressed populations, theories of human behavior, family, group, community and organizational functioning, an appreciation of research and methods of practice evaluation, and practice skills for practice with individuals, families, groups, communities and organizations.

Course Requirements

The Bachelor of Social Work requires completion of 121 credits, including 45 credits in the major. The curriculum of the baccalaureate program is specifically designed to prepare students for beginning-level generalist social work practice. This practice

model requires a broad base of knowledge about individuals, families, groups, communities and organizations and an appreciation of cultural diversity.

Major courses: Some representative courses students in Social Work take include the following:

- Intro to Social Work
- Communication in the Helping Process
- Human Behavior in the Social Environment
- Research in Social Work
- Social Welfare Legislation and Services
- Social Work Practice
- Social Work with Oppressed Groups
- Supervised Social Work Practice Internships

General Education Pre-professional Courses: General education pre-professional courses provide an essential foundation for the upper level professional curriculum and are required for admission to junior and senior social work courses. These courses include: anthropology, Biology, English, math, ethics or critical thinking, psychology, and sociology

Careers in Social Work

Employment opportunities for graduates with a B.S.W. degree are diverse and can include jobs that deal directly with people, as well as jobs in community planning, organizational administration and policy development. Typical areas of employment include the following:

- public child welfare
- foster care and adoption services
- social work in hospital settings
- social work in mental health settings

- alcohol and substance abuse treatment centers
- social work with persons who are elderly
- public and semi-private organizations that deal with minorities and oppressed groups, including:
 - women's and children's shelters
 - AIDS treatment and prevention centers
 - teen-age pregnancy prevention programs
 - domestic violence prevention and treatment
 - administration and policy development of organizations that provide services to minority and oppressed groups.
